Course Description

This course critically examines China's remarkable economic performance and places it in both historical and comparative contexts. The course also addresses contemporary challenges and investigates current events to provide a nuanced understanding of China's ongoing economic and social transformation.

- Assess China's role in international trade, investment, and global economic governance.
- ➤ Identify and evaluate the social, environmental, and economic challenges facing China.
- ➤ Evaluate the challenges and opportunities facing China in sustaining its economic development.
