FROM THE PRESIDENT



The 2024–2025 academic year was one of remarkable progress, resilience, and renewed purpose at Elmira College. In many ways, it was a year of firsts - new records set, new programs launched, and new paths forged - yet it was also a year defined by complex

challenges facing higher education nationwide. Through it all, the strength and spirit of our community continued to shine, grounded in our mission, and guided by the 2023–2028 Strategic Plan.

Our momentum is real and measurable. We welcomed the largest incoming class in more than a decade in Fall 2024, with the second largest class on target to join us this fall - clear signs that our focused investment in student-centered, career-aligned academics, and co-curricular programs is resonating with today's students. In tandem, our fundraising reached inspiring new heights. Gifts for the year totaled \$5.9 million, and our alumni came together to support Elmira Everlasting, raising a record-high of more than \$270,000 during our annual day of giving.

We were also proud to receive confirmation from the Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE) that our accreditation was reaffirmed. Their Evaluation Team recognized not only our progress, but also the imagination, courage, and vision that define the Elmira College approach to student learning and institutional stewardship.

While we celebrate these milestones, we remain focused on the evolving landscape of higher education. Federal policy shifts, demographic changes, and increasing student needs - especially around mental health and support services - demand that we be both nimble and forward-thinking. We responded this year by launching new wellness and academic support initiatives, expanding our reach to first-generation and underrepresented students. Today, 170 years after its founding as an institution of rigor for women, Elmira College is still providing access to higher education.

Looking ahead, we are laying the groundwork for a bold and necessary step: the launch of a comprehensive campaign to strengthen Elmira College for generations to come. In preparation for the campaign, a feasibility study is underway to collect feedback from the College's stakeholders. Data from the survey will play a pivotal role in shaping our future initiatives and strategies and I thank you, in advance, for your participation.

None of this progress would be possible without you - our alumni, family, and friends. Your advocacy, your investment, and your pride in the College provide the foundation on which we continue to build. Together, we have accomplished much. Together, there is so much more to do.

Thank you for believing in Elmira College. The future is ours to shape.

ENHANCING STRENGTH AND STABILITY



Fall 2025 Recruitment

The 2024-2025 recruiting cycle remained strong with 286 net students (first-year and transfer) making an enrollment deposit as of June 30, 2025. That bodes well for hitting the Fall 2025 goal of 269 first-year and transfer students, and while it doesn't quite match Fall 2024's incoming class, it promises to be the second largest class in recent years. That keeps overall enrollment heading upward as smaller classes graduate and larger classes enter. Other numbers related to Fall 2025's incoming students include:

- **2,556 admission applications** received for Fall 2025 enrollment
- **2,050 students accepted** for an 80.25% admit rate.

New Initiatives Support Increased Enrollment

The College launched several new initiatives this past year designed to support increased enrollment. New athletics and recreational opportunities included Club Men's Ice Hockey, Competitive Dance, Women's Flag Football, and the Golden Groove Pep Band. Women's Flag Football was added and will become an NCAA sport in the 2025-2026 academic year. EC's team will compete in the Empire 8 Athletic Conference. The Good Neighbor and Northern Tier Awards were added to the College's financial aid strategies. These initiatives support students in Pennsylvania and its neighboring Northern Tier counties.

Persistence to Graduation

An important part of the College's strength and stability is persistence to graduation. At 65 percent, EC is above the national average and well above its peers.

New Public Health Minor Reaches Across Disciplines

As part of the strategy to enhance enrollment, two new minors, **Public Health** and **Politics & Society**, were introduced in the 2024-2025 academic year. Fully embracing the Public Health minor, **Deborah Woglom, Elmira College Nurse Education Instructor**, developed a new travel course that took eight EC students to a rural area of Panama over their break in March.

Prior to the trip, the students investigated the leading causes of illness, death, and disability in resource-constrained settings. When they arrived at the clinic, the students were quickly put in charge, leading the patient intake process, taking vitals, and sorting medications. They also educated patients, particularly children, about public health measures such as the importance of handwashing and why they should brush their teeth. Although not a typical spring break activity, the students were moved by what they learned and grateful for the experience.

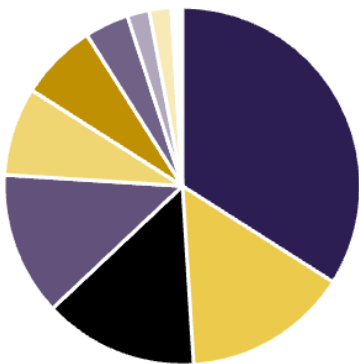

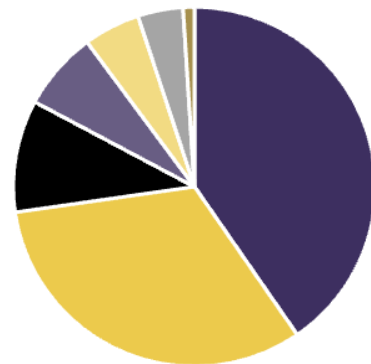

My name is Linda Avery. I'm a proud member of the **Tenacious Class of 2025** and just graduated with a major in Business Administration. I was among the first students in the accelerated Tommy Hilfiger Fashion Business School program.

I didn't go straight to college after high school. Growing up in a small town, I struggled with bullying and fitting in, which hurt my grades and my confidence. I felt lost and without direction, until I started working at Goodwill. Retail gave me purpose. I loved creating window displays, and my manager, recognizing my potential, encouraged me to pursue college. But I didn't want to waste time or money my family didn't have, especially when I wasn't sure what I wanted to do.

When I mentioned an interest in fashion - not design, but the business side - a friend asked if I'd heard of the new fashion business program at EC. I looked it up, applied, and later toured the campus. It immediately felt right, like God was pulling me there. I just hoped I'd be accepted. Even more, that I could afford it.



Thankfully, the **Leslie Gomborov Berman '62 Scholarship** made it possible. At EC, people believed in me. That support helped me become a confident leader and role model. I dove into classroom projects, joined and led clubs, and built the soft skills - like networking - that will set me apart.

Scholarships gave me the opportunity to grow and lead with EC spirit. They also gave me a real start toward my dream of launching a sustainable fashion brand and business.

FOSTERING INNOVATION



Thanks to a \$52,482 grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission, combined with a matching gift from alumna Janet Frankovsky '58, EC was able to purchase a 3D Anatomage touch display table for use across multiple academic programs. The table provides high-definition, real-life anatomical images, enabling EC students to study the human body and other elements in detail. Previously, similar training required travelling up to 200 miles to partner institutions. Now, EC students - and those from other regional schools like Lake Erie College of Osteopathic Medicine (LECOM) - can save time and money by completing those studies on campus.

New Term III Theatre Course Builds Career Skills

"I had no idea what to expect," admitted **Gargi Gupta '28**, a student in the Elmira College accelerated BS to DO program, when she signed up to take a newly created Term III Community Drama course. The course fit into her busy schedule and fulfilled a general education requirement, but that was all she knew before walking into the class designed by instructor, **Sarah K. Chalmers, Lecturer of Applied Theatre and Theatre Program Director**.

Gupta and the other students in the course quickly discovered they would be interviewing community elders and then use those interviews to develop and perform a play. The students worked in small teams to synthesize what they learned, teasing out themes from the 30 interviews, and creating characters based on those themes. With only weeks to develop the play, the students worked collaboratively to craft stories and choreograph movements that they could perform consistently enough to appear seamless. Yet each performance was a little different.

For Gupta, the interviews helped her develop the "bedside care" skills she'll need when she becomes a doctor.

Tommy Hilfiger Fashion Business School Graduates First Cohort in Accelerated Program

The first student cohort in the Tommy Hilfiger Fashion Business School three-year accelerated program graduated in May 2025. The accelerated option gives students the opportunity for extended internships, entering the workforce, and/or taking advantage of EC's partnerships with Regents University London and the Fashion Institute of Technology (FIT). **Jazmine Elliott '25** was among those students.



In addition to graduating Summa Cum Laude, she was the first to receive the THFBS Award - a \$5,000 scholarship supporting internship costs - which she used to cover housing costs for her internship with Burlington Stores at their New Jersey headquarters. That led to a \$10,000 National Retail Foundation x CVS Health Retail Leaders Scholarship Award to attend the 2025 National Retail Federation Student Conference in New York City. Post-graduation, she's headed back to NYC for a full-time role with Macy's corporate team in their Merchandising Executive Development Program. Elliott credits the THFBS program and her hands-on experiences for her success.

Under Wing Alumni Mentoring Program Pilot Yields Success

Launched in Fall 2024, the Under Wing Alumni Mentoring Program became a one-credit course in Winter 2025. This past year, 39 students completed career-readiness workshops, attended the *Beyond the Books: Soaring to Professional Success Etiquette Dinner*, and matched with 58 alumni mentors for networking and guidance. Several students, including **Neha Wajahat '25**, secured post-graduation jobs thanks to connections made through the Under Wing program.

New Guthrie Partnership Expands Internship Opportunities

Over the 2024-2025 academic year, **Dr. Veronica Moorman, EC Associate Professor of Chemistry**, worked with Dr. Joseph Choi, Professor and Chair of Orthopaedic Surgery and Director of Orthopaedic Research at Guthrie Robert Packer Hospital in Sayre, Pennsylvania, to establish a new internship program for upperclass science students interested in the medical field. Students participating in the program complete their internships during Term III at Guthrie, focusing on orthopedic medicine and clinical research. **Randall Wright '26**, Biochemistry major, **Wyatt Gastrock '27**, Biology major, and **Brady Buttice '26**, Biology major, participated in the program in its inaugural year. The goal is to expand the number of students participating in the coming year.

Local High School College-Prep Course Connects Students to EC

Elmira College partnered with the Greater Southern Tier BOCES New Visions Program, an accelerated college-prep program for high school seniors, during the 2024-2025 academic year. New Visions Health Careers Exploration admits 30 students per year for a deep immersion experience that explores the interrelationship between the student's academic subjects and career aspirations in the health field. The BOCES classes were held at the College throughout the academic year and students had periodic hands-on experiences in EC's health-related programs, such as Communication Sciences and Disorders, Nursing, Pre-Health Sciences, Medical Lab Sciences, and the EC-LECOM pathway. For GST BOCES, the program has proven successful and they are looking to expand the EC opportunity to other academic program areas in the coming year. For EC, the program has been mutually beneficial with five of the New Visions students making deposits to attend EC in Fall 2025.

INCLUSIVE & SUPPORTIVE ENVIRONMENT



Mental Health Programming for Students Expanded

Mental health continues to be a national concern amongst college students. A campus mental health survey found that, while Class Year distribution varied, first-year students and seniors were the most represented in ongoing counseling. Training for Resident Assistants is intentionally targeted to first-year students, who often need extra guidance transitioning to independent living.

Although the College provides on-campus counseling services, limitations related to staffing and treatment models led to off-campus referrals this past year. To help address the growing demand for mental health services, Residence Life staff increased proactive programming designed to build awareness and coping strategies.

Social and Cultural Engagement Brings Students Together

The Office of Social and Cultural Engagement offered programming throughout the year, often in partnership with student clubs, designed to bring students together in a fun and educational way. Programs included Taste of Home (with the Multicultural Club), Jazz Night (Black Student Union), National First-Generation Student Day, Soaring Higher Leadership Program, Latin Dance Class (Hispanic Heritage Month), Holi and Color Wars during May Days (Intercultural Student-Athlete Alliance and South Asian Student Association).

Inaugural David Buchtel Memorial Award Presented

A new award, the **David Buchtel Award**, was created in 2025 to recognize a member of the EC staff for their outstanding work and spirit. The award was developed in honor of David Buchtel, a Housekeeper at Elmira College from 2013 to 2020, who was beloved by students. He knew most by name and showed interest in both their personal and academic lives. Buchtel passed unexpectedly in 2020, but his upbeat attitude, care in his duties, and impact on students were remarkable. The inaugural recipient of the award was **Larry Sager, Housekeeper**.



Commuter Student Support Services Expanded

While EC remains a primarily residential campus, students who live within a certain radius (60 miles as of Fall 2024), can live at home and commute. To further support these students, a commuter web page was launched in Fall 2024, providing a one-stop shop for commuter-specific information. In addition, lounges were made more commuter friendly by adding microwaves to lounge spaces in Watson Fine Arts and Cowles Hall. **Aaron Lindgren, Supervisor of Student Success** with CAPE, took on the additional role of Commuter Liason, holding Commuter Forums throughout the academic year. The CAPE team also worked with the Office of Admissions to develop and send a letter to incoming commuter students introducing them to Lindgren and the resources offered.

Events like flag football and kickball take advantage of the year-round availability of the new turf on Campus Field. Elmira College Athletics in the Spotlight
